Clinic Tails

We do a lot of work with cats in need here at TLC, and a lot of our funds come from our little non-profit organization, "Rainbow Kitty Rescue." Rainbow Kitty was named by Dr. Andi's daughter when she was little, and the clinic was still located in the basement of their family home. Rainbow Kitty has come a long way since then, and is now a 501(c)3! Hundreds of kittens and cats have benefited from our little rescue over the years. These furry friends are given the medical care they need to survive and thrive. They are vaccinated, spayed/ neutered, and dewormed, and then we help them find their forever homes. With kittens this is usually pretty easy, but with older cats it can be a challenge.



This brings us to our latest Rainbow Kitties, "Chunk Norris" and "Pontoon." These two older brothers lived nice quiet lives with their owner, also an older gentleman, until recently when tragically their owner passed away suddenly. Chunk and Pontoon arrived to the clinic

stressed and traumatized by the sudden changes in their typically sedentary and uneventful lives. We set them up in our quiet isolation suite and gave them time to decompress.

Over the last 6 weeks, the boys have come a long way both emotionally and physically. They are eating a low calorie diet and have been losing weight steadily. This is very important, as they were so obese that moving



around was difficult and uncomfortable for them. With time and TLC, they are both finally settled down and were deemed ready for new homes mid-September.

Finding homes for older cats is difficult as it is, but trying to find a home for two older cats is next to impossible. For that reason we made the difficult decision to allow them to be adopted separately. Chunk found his home almost immediately, but Pontoon is still waiting for his perfect retirement home.

Paws for Thought

As we head into fall and early winter, it is important to think about spaying and neutering cats. "Kitten Season" in our area starts as early as January, which means that many of those cats are getting pregnant in November! It is vital to catch these cats before they have a chance to make more cats. This includes house pets, barn cats, and stray or community cats. Females can become pregnant at six months of age, and have their first litters before age one. Female cats average 4-6 kittens per litter, and can have 2-3 litters per year. The sooner we decommission that reproductive system the better. Cats can be spayed and neutered at TLC Animal Care as soon as they are 2 lbs, which works well for feral or barn kitties that may be difficult to catch as they age. Pet kitties typically get spayed/neutered around 16 weeks of age along with receiving their final vaccine boosters.
